[Opinion Editorial by Prime Minister of Ukraine. It did not run in any papers]

Much has changed for the people of Ukraine in the 12 years since our country achieved its independence. We have replaced a one-party police state with a vibrant democracy based on free and fair elections. A market economy is emerging from the ruins of the failed Soviet system. Our presence is growing on the international stage.

As I make my first official visit to the United States as Prime Minister, I can tell you that unlike many in the West, Ukrainians have seen tyranny in our lifetimes. We know the destabilizing threat posed by expansionist totalitarian regimes. And we understand quite well the dangers the world of order and civilization faces from those who have sworn to destroy it.

For these reasons, Ukraine has supported and continues to support the United States in the campaign it is waging against terror. Our country has sent more than 1,600 troops to Iraq to help secure an environment in which a nascent democratic state can take root and flourish. Ukraine's contribution is in fact the fourth-largest foreign troop contingent.

Our engagement in Iraq comes on the heels of our participation in international peacekeeping missions in both Kosovo and Bosnia. We also provided assistance in Afghanistan and support during the war to Kuwait.

Ukraine commends the United States for its noble undertaking to protect the free peoples of the world from the oppression of 21st century terrorism. We call on the other great nations of the world to support this effort. The United Nations must act now to give the countries participating in global efforts to fight terrorism the help needed to ensure a successful outcome in this critically important direction.

I look forward to continued cooperation between the United States and Ukraine, with relations built on mutual respect and trust. Ukraine faces many challenges. Our transformation to a democratic society based on the rule of law and a market economy has been neither fast nor smooth. But we share many of the same advantages the United States enjoyed when it was a young democracy. Our nation is rich in natural resources, with a well educated and energetic people who are determined to improve their lives when given the freedom and opportunities to do so.

We have taken major steps to establish transparency in our governmental practices and programs. For the first time ever, the national government's budget is being published for citizens to examine before it is voted on by parliament and official accepted. The people now have a clear picture of the actions of their elected officials. They will hold us accountable.

Our corporate and banking institutions have begun laying the groundwork for the financial transparency and accounting standards needed to conduct business on the international level when have renewed our commitment to fighting money laundering within our borders by passing tough new legislation.

Our priority is consistent work to improve laws in the areas of investment and finance, as well as increased protections for national and foreign investors. New investment will bring new businesses. Developing a domestic pool of financial expertise will allow us to make this transition in a way that eases the economic dislocations and best matches our country's unique circumstances. We also face many of the same challenges as the United States: bridging the gap between the rich and poor, raising the standard of living of all our citizens, providing a good education for all our children, improving health care, meeting the needs of our senior citizens, maintaining a safe and secure society and providing for the national defense. These remain lofty goals, but they must be the aspirations of all democratic societies. Ukrainians are committed to making that effort.

Of course, we will continue looking outward. Our support of the United States' fight against terror is simply one element of Ukraine's increased participation in international affairs. We remain committed to eventually joining multinational institutions. In the immediate future we expect Ukraine to be accepted by the World Trade Organization and we will continue our direction toward Euro-Atlantic integration. With time to develop and the wisdom that comes only from experience, Ukraine is poised for future success.
