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A United Eastern Mediterranean Front: How Israel, Greece, and Cyprus Strengthen US Security

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Introduction

[The emerging plan by Israel, Greece, and Cyprus to form a joint military force in the eastern Mediterranean](#) signals a serious shift in regional defense cooperation. Faced with mounting pressure from Turkey's military buildup and its aggressive posture toward neighbors, these three democracies are choosing coordination over isolation. Israel and Greece would each contribute about 1,000 soldiers, with Cyprus providing around 500. Each country would assign an air force squadron, supported by Israeli and Greek naval vessels, including submarines.

The force would be positioned across Israel, Cyprus, and key Greek islands such as Rhodes and Karpathos. Its mission would focus on rapid response to crises, protection of maritime routes, and defense of underwater energy infrastructure. The sabotage of the Nord Stream pipelines in 2022 showed how exposed such infrastructure can be. Eastern Mediterranean gas fields and pipelines face similar risks.

Deterrence in the Face of Turkish Pressure

Turkey's expanding military footprint in the eastern Mediterranean, along with its involvement in Syria and its confrontations with Greece and Cyprus, has driven growing concern among regional democracies. Ankara's disputes over maritime boundaries, coupled with President Recep Tayyip Erdogan's hostile rhetoric toward Israel, have raised fears of miscalculation.

For Israel, cooperation with Greece and Cyprus provides depth beyond its immediate borders. For Greece and Cyprus, a partnership with Israel adds proven military capacity and intelligence cooperation. Together, they create a balanced counterweight that discourages unilateral action by Turkey without escalating into open confrontation.

Why This Matters for the United States

From Washington's perspective, this cooperation is a net gain. Israel, Greece, and Cyprus are all stable democracies aligned with the United States on core security interests. A coordinated force among them strengthens deterrence against hostile actors that challenge Western influence, including state and nonstate threats.

This arrangement allows the United States to reinforce regional security without placing additional American forces on the ground. Instead, it relies on capable partners that already train with US forces, use compatible equipment, and share intelligence. The result is a forward response capability that supports American interests at lower political and military cost.

Protecting Energy and Economic Stability

The eastern Mediterranean has become a key energy corridor linking Middle Eastern gas reserves to European markets. Israel's gas production, Cyprus's offshore resources, and Greece's transit role form a connected system. Disruption to this system would ripple through European economies and affect global energy markets.

A joint military force focused on protecting pipelines, ports, and offshore platforms reduces the risk of sabotage or coercion. Energy security remains national security for the United States and its allies. By supporting partners that guard these assets, Washington strengthens resilience across allied economies.

Postwar Gaza and Regional Cooperation

The discussions around this force have occurred alongside renewed diplomatic engagement between Israel and Greece, including meetings involving senior Israeli security officials. These talks have covered regional security and postwar planning for Gaza.

Greece and Cyprus have shown interest in contributing to reconstruction and stabilization efforts once conditions permit. Close coordination among democratic partners raises the odds that any future arrangements will exclude terrorist groups and support civilian governance. This aligns with US goals of preventing Gaza from returning to a base for extremist violence.

A Democratic Security Triangle

What sets this initiative apart is the nature of the partners involved. Israel, Greece, and Cyprus share democratic systems, professional militaries, and long-standing ties with the United States. Their cooperation rests on shared values and shared threat assessments.

This grouping sends a clear message. Democratic states in the eastern Mediterranean are prepared to defend themselves, protect shared resources, and stand together against intimidation. That message reinforces US credibility and strengthens deterrence across a sensitive region.

Conclusion

The possible formation of a joint Israel–Greece–Cyprus military force represents a meaningful step toward a more secure eastern Mediterranean. It protects vital energy infrastructure, discourages aggression, and supports postwar stability efforts tied to Gaza. For the United States, it brings three dependable democratic allies into closer alignment as a forward response team against threats to Western security.
