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# Hiding “Pay-for-Slay”: What the Palestinian Authority Changed, What It Did Not, and Why It Matters

The Palestinian Authority’s long-running system of payments to prisoners and to families of those killed while attacking Israelis has been a sticking point in U.S. and European policy debates for years. In February 2025, PA President Mahmoud Abbas issued a decree that the PA said would end the old system and move assistance into a new welfare-style framework. The announcement drew quick international attention because it appeared to answer a core U.S. demand tied to violence and incitement. The real question is whether the policy ended or was re-labeled in ways that keep incentives intact while easing pressure from donors.

## What Abbas announced in February 2025

On February 10 to 11, 2025, Reuters reported that Mahmoud Abbas revoked the longstanding system of allowances tied to Palestinians imprisoned or killed by Israel and shifted the program into a new administrative structure. Reuters described the move as aimed at addressing tensions with the United States, where the program has been criticized as rewarding violence.

At the European level, the European Commission issued a joint statement welcoming the decree-law issued in mid-February 2025 and described it as restructuring social assistance in a way meant to be based on need.

PA-linked messaging also presented the change as a transfer of responsibility for protection and social welfare programs to a foundation that would provide assistance "without discrimination."

## Why critics say the reform may not be real reform

The core concern raised by watchdog groups and several media reports is simple: a change in paperwork does not automatically change incentives. If payments still reach individuals based on imprisonment for attacks or death while carrying out violence, the effect remains a reward structure even if the account name or administrative office changes.

Euronews [reported](https://www.euronews.com/2025/11/18/is-the-palestinian-martyrs-fund-still-operational?utm_source=chatgpt.com) in November 2025 that the European Commission said it “profoundly regrets” payments that were made “regardless” of the fund’s closure, while noting claims that the system may still function through bypass channels.

The Jerusalem Post [reported](https://www.jpost.com/middle-east/article-871734?utm_source=chatgpt.com) around the same period on claims that the policy continued, despite public international praise earlier in 2025, and pointed to the gap between donor assumptions and what recipients were reporting.

Independent analysts at the Jerusalem Institute for Strategy and Security [described](https://jiss.org.il/en/kuperwasser-tal-the-new-mechanism-for-paying-salaries-to-palestinian-prisoners/?utm_source=chatgpt.com) a “new mechanism” for payments and discussed concerns that the underlying structure could remain intact even after the decree.

## **How international actors reacted, and why that reaction matters**

France’s Foreign Ministry publicly welcomed reforms it described as effective, including the “abrogation of the prisoners’ payment system,” in a September 2025 conference statement. That language matters because it shows how quickly major donor governments can treat announced reforms as settled facts, especially when the PA is under financial stress and donors are searching for a workable path forward.

That financial dimension is not abstract. The Associated Press reported on a major EU aid package intended to stabilize the PA and support governance and recovery, including substantial direct budget support tied to reform expectations. When large sums move into a strained budget environment, oversight becomes more than a technical issue. It becomes a test of whether donors are funding genuine welfare policy or indirectly subsidizing a system that still treats terrorism-related imprisonment and death as a basis for payout.

## **Conclusion**

The February 2025 decree from Mahmoud Abbas was widely presented as a turning point on “pay-for-slay,” and European institutions publicly welcomed it as reform. Later reporting and analysis raised serious doubts that the policy ended in substance rather than in branding and internal routing. For U.S. and European policymakers, the next step is straightforward: treat claims of reform as a starting point, not an endpoint, and require transparent, auditable proof that payments are no longer linked to terrorism-related imprisonment or death.

In a significant shift, the Palestinian Authority (PA) recently announced changes, albeit retaining the payments system itself. In 2025, PA President Mahmoud Abbas signed a decree said to end the "Pay-for-Slay" policy in response to international pressure from the United States and the European Union.

Yet, reports indicate that the PA has adjusted **the mechanisms** of payment rather than eliminating them. Almost **19 million shekels** were reported to be allocated to beneficiaries linked to acts of terrorism even post-announcement, as documented by Palestinian Media Watch.

Noteworthy changes include:

- **Redirection of payments** through alternative channels, such as postal services
- **Reclassification of budget allocations** to reduce public scrutiny
- **Retention of a framework** where financial support ostensibly varies according to *duration of sentence* and the nature of the act

This development raises vital questions regarding transparency and accountability...if donor nations tie aid to the cessation of these payments, moving them "off-book" could obscure compliance while outcomes remain unchanged.

## How might these changes affect international perceptions of the Palestinian Authority?

International assessments of the Palestinian Authority (PA) will likely hinge on whether the recent leadership reshuffles are interpreted as **genuine reform** or simple *elite restructuring*. An analysis from INSS indicates that the PLO's appointment of Hussein al-Sheikh as deputy chairman on April 26, 2025, reflects significant external influence, notably from Saudi Arabia, in addition to Abbas's desire to maintain stability.

In practical terms, foreign governments may reevaluate the PA based on critical indicators:

- **Governability:** Does the new structure lessen fragmentation within Fatah and improve decision-making?
- **Legitimacy:** Is al-Sheikh viewed domestically as a legitimate leader or as an "Israeli-backed appointee" undermining his position, as remarked by INSS?
- **Public mandate:** Can the PA convincingly represent public interests even with polls indicating waning support for Fatah and rising backing for Hamas (PCPSR reports)?

Furthermore, contemporary analyses suggest that the humanitarian crisis in Gaza impacts global perspectives, implying that the PA's standing abroad may fluctuate based on its perceived role relative to Hamas and its potential efficacy as a governing body.

Israel uses advance warnings, legal reviews, precision strikes, and humanitarian coordination to reduce civilian harm during wars with Hamas and Hezbollah, exceeding international law requirements.

Precision Targeting and Timing Choices

Israel invests heavily in intelligence (<https://www.ynetnews.com/opinions-analysis/article/r1moukwhr>) and precision munitions to strike specific military assets rather than broad areas. Strikes often occur at night or at times assessed to reduce civilian presence. When real-time surveillance shows civilians entering a target area, strikes are delayed or canceled. Such cancellations, reported by Israeli officials, reflect a preference for restraint even when lawful targets exist.

Humanitarian Corridors and Pauses

After action assessments review intelligence accuracy, civilian harm reports, and compliance with rules, Israel maintains mechanisms for investigation, including criminal inquiries when warranted. Documentation includes video, communications logs, and legal opinions. This record supports transparency and responses to international inquiries.

# HOW DOCTORS WITHOUT BORDERS TURNED FROM A NEUTRAL NGO INTO AN ANTI-ISRAEL ADVOCACY GROUP

Israel has stated that it supports humanitarian access for civilians in Gaza and has continued to coordinate with numerous international organizations during the current conflict. At the same time, Israeli authorities argue that humanitarian access must be accompanied by neutrality, transparency, and safeguards against exploitation by terrorist organizations. Following a formal review process, the Government of Israel has concluded that **Médecins Sans Frontières, known in the United States as Doctors Without Borders**

(<https://ideas.tikvah.org/mosaic/picks/how-hatred-for-israel-corrupted-a-famed-international-medical-philanthropy>) (**MSF**) did not meet those standards (<https://govextra.gov.il/mda/msf/home/>). Israeli officials describe a pattern of conduct that they say contradicts core principles of humanitarian action.

This article presents MSF's breaches of neutrality and transparency, outlines the registration requirements imposed on international organizations operating in Gaza, and explains why Israeli authorities say compliance is necessary in a conflict environment shaped by Hamas control.

## Israel's Position on Humanitarian Neutrality

The October 7, 2023 massacre carried out by **Hamas** resulted in the deaths of more than 1,200 people in Israel, according to Israeli government figures, and included mass civilian casualties and hostage taking. The international community characterizes (<https://www.hrw.org/news/2024/07/17/october-7-crimes-against-humanity-war-crimes-hamas-led-groups>) these actions as clear violations of international humanitarian law.

According to Israel's formal review (<https://govextra.gov.il/media/140dx15x/consolidated-review-of-preliminary-findings-regarding-m%C3%A9decins-sans-fronti%C3%A8res.pdf>), MSF did not publicly condemn those attacks in direct terms. Israeli authorities argue that humanitarian organizations have a responsibility to denounce deliberate attacks on civilians, regardless of political context. Remaining silent in the face of such actions undermines the principle of neutrality.

Neutrality requires equal moral clarity toward violations committed by any actor. They argue that failing to acknowledge the October 7 atrocities signals political selectivity rather than impartial humanitarian engagement.

## Allegations of Politicized Rhetoric

Many have further accused MSF of shifting from medical activity into political anti-Israel advocacy (<https://ngo-monitor.org/backgrounder-on-msf-doctors-without-borders-and-israels-ngo-registration-policies/>). According to Israel's review, the organization used legally charged terminology in public communications that were unsubstantiated and inflammatory.



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maintains that defensive military operations against Hamas are conducted the framework of international law and in response to ongoing rocket fire, networks, and hostage holding. Israeli leaders argue that characterizing those operations using legal conclusions before international judicial determination (https://justorium.org/support-network/) is not appropriate. From Israel's perspective, humanitarian groups are expected to focus on medical service delivery and factual reporting rather than issuing legal judgments that delegitimize defensive actions.

## Transparency and Reporting Concerns

A central issue raised in Israel's findings involves reporting standards. Israeli officials state that MSF relied on local accounts without systematic cross-referencing with Israeli authorities or clearly disclosing its data collection methodology.

Israel argues that in a territory controlled by Hamas, independent verification is necessary to prevent the spread of inaccurate or manipulated information. Hamas has long exercised authority over institutions in Gaza, including the local Ministry of Health. Israeli officials point to documented instances where Hamas has used civilian infrastructure for military purposes, including tunnels under hospitals and weapon storage sites, as reported during prior conflicts.

Responsible reporting in such an environment requires coordination and verification across multiple sources.

## Registration Protocol and Compliance

Israel introduced a registration protocol for international organizations operating in Gaza. Officials describe this framework as a standard transparency and security mechanism intended to prevent the [exploitation \(https://ngo-monitor.org/reports/puppet-regime-hamas-ngo-gaza/\)](https://ngo-monitor.org/reports/puppet-regime-hamas-ngo-gaza/) of humanitarian infrastructure by Hamas.

More than 20 international organizations complied with these requirements and continue delivering aid. Israel states it has facilitated their entry, movement, and supply coordination.

In contrast, MSF declined to submit certain required personnel documentation. Israeli officials argue that vetting staff in a territory governed by a designated terrorist organization is a reasonable safeguard. The United States formally designated **Hamas** as a Foreign Terrorist Organization in 1997, reinforcing Israel's position that oversight measures are justified.

Israel states that refusal to comply raises concerns, particularly in light of verified cases across Gaza involving aid personnel with links to terrorist activity. Israeli officials argue that preventing infiltration protects both civilians and humanitarian workers.



# Scope of MSF Operations in Gaza

Officials note that MSF operates five clinics out of more than 200 total clinics in Gaza, and two out of 15 field hospitals. While these facilities provide important

services, MSF's operational footprint is limited relative to the broader medical infrastructure.

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Humanitarian assistance continues through other international actors who have met compliance requirements.

## Internal Criticism

Israel has pointed to criticism from within MSF's own leadership ranks. A former MSF president publicly accused the organization of acting in ways that indirectly supported Hamas narratives. This internal criticism is evidence that concerns about neutrality are not limited to government sources.

## Conclusion

Israel maintains that humanitarian access to Gaza remains a priority and that dozens of international organizations continue operating under agreed transparency standards. At the same time, Israeli authorities argue that neutrality, accountability, and registration compliance are necessary safeguards in a territory controlled by Hamas.

MSF failed to condemn the October 7 atrocities, adopted politicized language, relied on opaque reporting practices, and declined to comply with personnel documentation requirements. Israel views these actions as breaches of humanitarian conduct standards.

Israeli officials state that humanitarian aid will continue to be facilitated for organizations that adhere to neutrality, transparency, and security safeguards. The broader debate highlights the tension between humanitarian independence and state responsibility to prevent terror infiltration during active conflict.

# HOW ISRAEL INVESTIGATES ALLEGED WAR CRIMES, AND WHAT ACCOUNTABILITY CAN LOOK LIKE

Israel investigates alleged war crimes through an independent Military Advocate General, fact-finding reviews, criminal probes, and military courts with civilian oversight.



Israel's war with Hamas, triggered by the October 7, 2023 massacre, has produced intense scrutiny of Israeli military conduct in Gaza. Under Israeli law and the law of armed conflict, Israel has a duty to examine credible allegations, gather facts, and take action when wrongdoing is found. Israel's system is not a single office or a press statement. It is a pipeline that runs from operational reporting, to independent legal review, to criminal investigation, to military courts, with civilian oversight through Israel's Attorney General and judicial review in Israel's Supreme Court sitting as the High Court of Justice.

**What the Gaza war changed: volume, time, and documentation**

The Gaza war created an unusually large universe of allegations and "exceptional incidents," with claims coming from soldiers' reports, civilians, NGOs, journalists, and foreign governments. AOAV's August 2025 breakdown, attributed to the MAG, lists categories inside the 74 criminal probes: detainee deaths, alleged custody mistreatment, unlawful property destruction, pillaging or theft, and alleged illegal use of force.

### When investigations produce real consequences

Accountability is best explained through outcomes, not slogans. Two cases from the Gaza war period show the difference between administrative discipline and criminal prosecution.

### What critics say, and why Israel argues the system still matters

A common criticism is that too many files close without charges or remain unresolved, with critics arguing that internal military systems lack transparency and move slowly. An AOAV report, covered in major media, claimed a high closure or unresolved rate for a set of reported cases, with limited prosecutions during the period it studied. Israel and the IDF respond that investigations require battlefield data, classified intelligence, and witness access that can be hard to secure during active combat, and that the staged model prevents premature criminalization of split-second decisions while still permitting prosecutions when evidence exists. The IDF's MAG Corps pages describe that staged structure and the MAG's directing role in criminal investigations.

Another reason the matter is external legal exposure. The ICC remains active on Gaza-related allegations, with a December 15, 2025 ruling rejecting an Israeli bid to narrow the probe's scope. That pressure makes credible domestic accountability more of a moral issue. It is part of Israel's legal defense in international forums.

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Israel investigates alleged war crimes through a layered military justice system led by the Military Advocate General, supported by fact-finding assessments, military police investigations, and military courts, with civilian oversight and judicial review channels.

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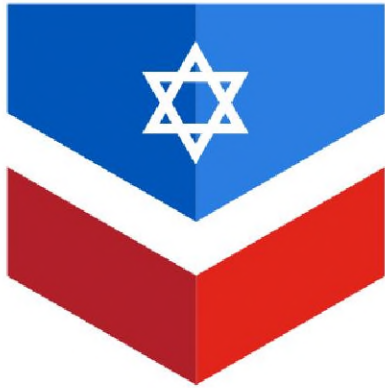

## Israel and the Middle East's Only Growing Christian Community

The result is a Christian population that holds public office, serves in the military, succeeds in education, and lives under equal protection of the law. At a time when Christian communities across the region face steady decline, Israel presents a clear and documented contrast.

Later, more than one million Jews immigrated from the former Soviet Union after restrictions were lifted. These movements increased Israel's population several times over. Christian population growth continued during the same period, even as its share of the total declined due to Jewish immigration.

## The Regional Collapse of Christian Communities

In recent months, Israeli forces acted to protect [Druze](#) communities in Syria after reports of mass violence. Israel affirmed that it would not ignore threats to minority communities near its borders. Netanyahu also stated publicly that Israel remains committed to defending endangered Christian communities from Syria to Nigeria when circumstances allow.

These actions align with Israel's broader record. The Jewish state, shaped by its own minority history, treats religious pluralism as a matter of national interest and moral responsibility.

## Distortion and Its Consequences

Claims that Israel persecutes Christians misrepresent documented reality. These narratives also paint an inaccurate picture of Christian life under many Muslim-majority regimes. When such claims spread, they

Israel has shown that a Jewish state can protect religious minorities and offer them a future. The greater harm from false portrayals falls on Middle Eastern Christians themselves, whose plight becomes obscured by political slogans rather than addressed through honest assessment.

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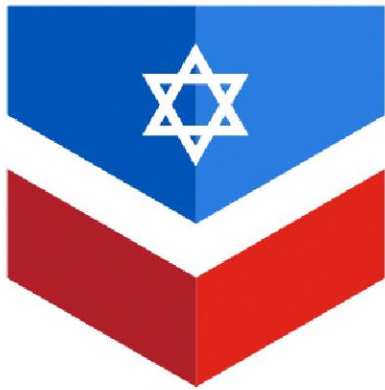

## Israel's 350th F-35 Wing Delivery Shows How the US and Israel Defend Each Other

Security ties between the United States and Israel often get described only in terms of aid and weapons purchases. The reality looks more like a two-way production and defense relationship, built over decades, where each side brings something the other side uses. [Israel Aerospace Industries delivering its 350th set of F-35 wings to Lockheed Martin](#) is a clear example because it links Israeli manufacturing know-how to America's flagship fighter program and to allied air forces that rely on it. When a partner builds core parts of a jet flown by the US and its allies, that partner is not only receiving security help, it is helping shape the capability itself.

It reported that the IDF announced three F-35i aircraft arrived at Nevatim Air Force Base in January 2026, raising Israel's inventory to 48 out of 50 already purchased. That means Israel is both a user of the aircraft and a producer of a core part that other users depend on.

## Israel's contribution: high-skill manufacturing that feeds US strength

IAI and Lockheed Martin have a long record of working together on aircraft structures. In the Jerusalem Post account, IAI's aviation division has manufactured and assembled wings for Lockheed Martin aircraft

since the 1980s, and it established an F-35 wing production line in 2014.

The technical detail that stands out is the wing skin work. The report describes F-35 wing skins made from composite materials using Automatic Fiber Placement (AFP). Lockheed Martin's Israel-focused coverage has also described AFP as the method used to manufacture the F-35 wing skins, emphasizing the specialized nature of the production.

This is where the relationship becomes more than a buyer-seller arrangement. Israel is not only receiving aircraft. Israeli industry is building parts that go into aircraft the US and other allies fly. That creates shared interests and shared standards, plus deep daily contact between engineers, quality teams, and production managers on both sides.

## The US contribution: security backing and strategic continuity

The United States provides Israel with major long-term security assistance through formal agreements. The 2016 memorandum of understanding set military assistance at \$38 billion over FY2019 to FY2028, widely described as \$3.8 billion per year. This long horizon helps Israel plan procurement and build forces around common systems that can operate with US forces when required.

That stability also feeds the industrial link. A predictable relationship makes it easier for US prime contractors and Israeli manufacturers to plan long production runs, hire and train skilled workers, and invest in tooling that supports strict defense standards.

## "Defense of the other": what reciprocity looks like in practice

Reciprocity does not always mean each side fields troops for the other. In modern defense relationships, reciprocity often looks like shared capability that raises the safety and effectiveness of both militaries.

- **For the United States**, an ally that helps produce F-35 components supports a broader aircraft ecosystem, including sustainment, production resilience, and the allied base that flies interoperable equipment. The Jerusalem Post reported that Lockheed Martin cites extensive global F-35 use and operational hours, showing how wide this ecosystem has become.
- **For Israel**, access to US aircraft, training links, and long-term security support helps deter common threats and maintain readiness, while Israel's own defense industry contributes to shared technology and production capacity.

- Israel has opened a roughly 2,000-year-old stepped street linking the Pool of Siloam to the area near the Temple Mount and Western Wall, identified ([https://www.jpost.com/archaeology/article-885516?utm\\_source=chatgpt.com](https://www.jpost.com/archaeology/article-885516?utm_source=chatgpt.com)) by archaeologists as a major route for pilgrims during the Second Temple period.

It is a reminder that Jewish connection to Jerusalem is not only in texts and prayers but in stonework, city planning, and day-to-day life.

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A window into the Great Revolt and the end of the Second Temple era

Beneath the street, archaeologists uncovered an ancient drainage channel. The City of David and Jerusalem Post reporting describe it as a place where Jewish rebels may have used the channel during the period of revolt against Rome.

The finds reported from this channel are striking: cooking pots, oil lamps, hundreds of bronze coins from the Great Revolt, and even a sword linked to a Roman legionary. These objects are the material footprint of a city under siege and a population fighting for its future. They also tie the site to the same historical rupture remembered on Tisha B'Av and described in ancient sources, the Roman destruction of Jerusalem and the Temple in 70 CE.

Christians care about Second Temple Jerusalem because it is the setting of the New Testament. The Pilgrimage Road sits in the same urban landscape that existed under Roman rule in the first century, a period that includes the life of Jesus. Without careful work, these layers would remain buried or get damaged, and a key chapter in the story of Jerusalem would stay out of reach.
