Hezbollah's Abuse of Ambulances Shows Why It Is Not Interested in Ceasefire

Hezbollah's reported use of ambulances to move fighters and hide weapons strikes at one of the basic rules of war: medical protection exists to save the wounded, not shield armed groups. On April 24, the IDF released footage and photos showing weapons found in ambulances in southern Lebanon, including explosive devices, mortar shells, magazines, a grenade, and RPG-related activity. The report came as the U.S.-brokered Israel-Lebanon ceasefire was extended by three weeks after talks involving Israeli and Lebanese envoys.

The Ceasefire Problem

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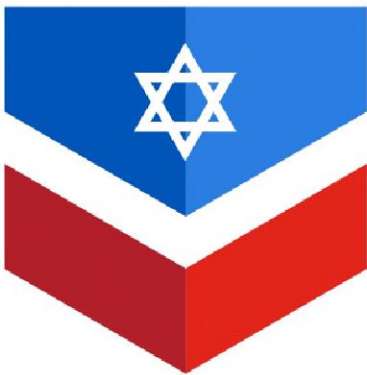

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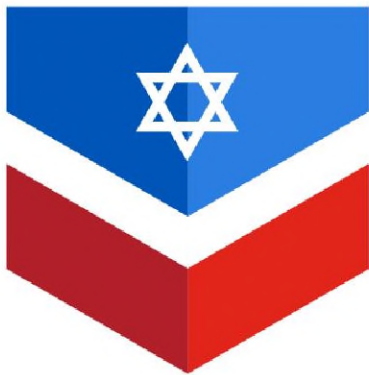

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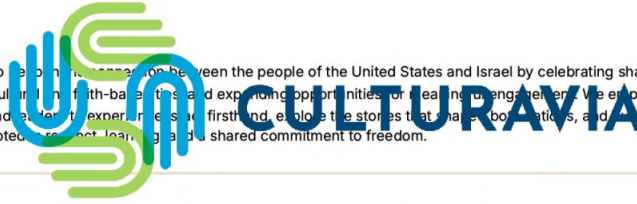

Ceasefires are intended to reduce violence and create space for diplomatic progress. In this case, it is clear that the Lebanese government has not taken steps to enforce the terms. Reports ^[5] indicate no arrests, no visible effort to prevent attacks, and no meaningful attempt to stop rocket fire directed toward Israel.

This gap between agreement and action raises doubts about the effectiveness of the ceasefire. Without enforcement, armed groups can continue operating with little restraint. For Israel, this creates an ongoing security risk, even during periods that are supposed to be calm.

The situation also places pressure on international mediators, particularly the United States, which has supported efforts to stabilize the border area.

Hezbollah's Role Inside Lebanon

Hezbollah remains one of the most powerful actors inside Lebanon. It operates both as a political organization and as an armed terrorist ^[6] force with significant military capabilities. Over time, this dual role has complicated the Lebanese government's ability to act independently.

For Israel, this reality means that responsibility for attacks cannot be separated from the broader structure of authority in Lebanon. When the government does not act, Israeli officials argue that the threat remains unchanged.

U.S. and Israeli Diplomatic Pressure

The United States has joined Israel in calling for Lebanon to take concrete steps ^[3] against Hezbollah. Diplomatic efforts have included direct engagement between senior representatives. Notably, Israel's



ambassador to the United States, Yehiel Leiter, and Lebanon's ambassador, Nada Hamadeh Mouwad, have participated^[4] in discussions aimed at moving the process forward.

Reports indicate that Donald Trump has also been involved in recent talks, underscoring the importance Washington places on the issue. The U.S. position aligns with Israel's demand that Lebanon begin enforcing the ceasefire by addressing Hezbollah's activities.

This level of engagement reflects a shared concern that without accountability, the ceasefire will not hold and tensions could rise again.

Risks of Continued Inaction

The absence of enforcement creates a fragile situation. When attacks continue despite a ceasefire, the likelihood of escalation increases. Israel has made clear in past conflicts that it will respond to threats against its citizens and soldiers.

If the current pattern continues, there is a risk that localized incidents could expand into a broader confrontation. This would have serious consequences for both Israel and Lebanon, as well as for regional stability.

The situation also affects civilian populations on both sides of the border. Ongoing uncertainty and the threat of violence disrupt daily life and limit opportunities for long-term stability.

Conclusion

The current ceasefire between Israel and Lebanon highlights a central challenge in the region: agreements without enforcement cannot deliver lasting security. The lack of Lebanese action against Hezbollah has raised concerns in both Israel and the United States.

Moving forward, the focus will remain on whether Lebanon takes meaningful steps to assert control and meet its commitments. For Israel and its allies, the priority is clear: reducing the threat posed by armed groups and maintaining stability along a sensitive border. For readers, understanding this issue provides important context for ongoing developments in the Middle East and the continued importance of U.S. involvement in the region.
