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A Historic Turning Point: The Israel-Lebanon Agreement Could Transform the Middle East

An Opportunity That Must Not Be Wasted

Of course, success is far from guaranteed.

Hezbollah has spent decades building its military infrastructure and may resist efforts to surrender its weapons. Iran is unlikely to abandon one of its most valuable regional assets without attempting to preserve its influence.

Implementation will therefore require sustained political commitment from Lebanon, continued American engagement, and strong international support.

Nevertheless, the existence of obstacles should not obscure the significance of the opportunity.

For the first time in many years, there is a credible diplomatic framework aimed not simply at pausing conflict but at fundamentally changing the security architecture of southern Lebanon.

Conclusion

The agreement signed by the United States, Israel, and Lebanon should be viewed as much more than a diplomatic document.

It represents an ambitious attempt to replace the failed model of perpetual ceasefires with a strategy rooted in sovereignty, accountability, and the gradual dismantling of one of the Middle East's most dangerous terrorist organizations.

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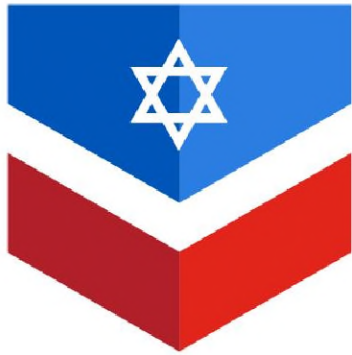
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The U.S. and the Gulf Draw a New Red Line: No Iran Reconstruction Without Disarmament

For months, critics have claimed that President Trump's agreement with Iran represented a retreat from America's traditional security posture in the Middle East. Yet the joint statement issued following U.S. Secretary of State Marco Rubio's meeting with the foreign ministers of the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) tells a very different story.

Far from accepting Iran's regional ambitions, the United States and its Arab allies have laid down one of the clearest post-war strategic visions yet. It explicitly states that lasting regional peace requires confronting "the full spectrum" of Iran's threats, including its ballistic missiles, armed drones, and continued sponsorship of proxy organizations across the Middle East. In other words, Washington and its Gulf partners are signaling that Iran cannot expect sanctions relief or regional normalization while continuing to arm Hezbollah, Hamas, the Houthis, and other militias.

Economic Engagement Comes With Conditions

Equally important is the economic language.

Rather than offering Iran unconditional sanctions relief, the statement^[2] makes clear that trade and investment will be **conditional and reversible**. Economic engagement will depend not only on Iran's compliance with the nuclear memorandum and any final agreement, but also on ending its destabilizing regional behavior.

Hormuz Is a Global Red Line

The communiqué also sends a powerful message^[6] regarding the Strait of Hormuz.

The ministers reaffirm that free, unconditional and unrestricted navigation through the waterway is essential for regional and global security, while explicitly rejecting any attempt to impose tolls, fees or unilateral control over one of the world's most important maritime chokepoints.

Given Iran's repeated threats to disrupt shipping, this language signals that freedom of navigation remains a non-negotiable principle for both Washington and its Arab partners.

Lebanon: Sovereignty Means Disarming Hezbollah

One of the most significant—and perhaps underreported—sections concerns Lebanon.

The statement^[3] welcomes ongoing American-mediated negotiations between Israel and Lebanon while declaring that true Lebanese sovereignty cannot exist as long as non-state armed groups continue to possess independent military capabilities.

This is a remarkably direct formulation. It effectively states that Hezbollah's continued existence as an armed force is incompatible with full Lebanese sovereignty.

Rather than presenting Hezbollah as part of Lebanon's political landscape, the communiqué frames its disarmament as a prerequisite for restoring the Lebanese state's monopoly over the use of force.

Gaza: Reconstruction Requires Demilitarization

Even more noteworthy is the language on Gaza.

The statement explicitly links reconstruction to the demilitarization^[7] of all non-state armed organizations. In practical terms, that means Hamas cannot remain an armed force if Gaza is to be rebuilt.

This represents an important convergence between the United States and the Gulf states. Reconstruction is no longer presented simply as a humanitarian project but as part of a broader political and security settlement in which armed terrorist organizations must relinquish control.

At the same time, the statement emphasizes that Gazans should not be forced to leave the territory out of necessity and that anyone who departs voluntarily should be able to return whenever they choose. This seeks to counter claims that reconstruction plans are tied to permanent displacement while reinforcing that demilitarization—not depopulation—is the objective.

Conclusion

Much attention has focused on the U.S.-Iran memorandum itself, but the Rubio-GCC communiqué may ultimately prove just as consequential.

It reveals a remarkably unified regional vision in which diplomacy with Iran is inseparable from confronting its missile program, curbing its proxy network, protecting international shipping, restoring Lebanese sovereignty through Hezbollah's disarmament, and ensuring that Gaza's reconstruction can only proceed after Hamas is disarmed.

For years, many argued that the Arab states would never publicly embrace such positions. This statement suggests that the strategic landscape has shifted dramatically. The emerging regional consensus is no longer simply about containing Iran's nuclear ambitions—it is about dismantling the architecture of Iranian-backed militancy that has destabilized the Middle East for decades.
