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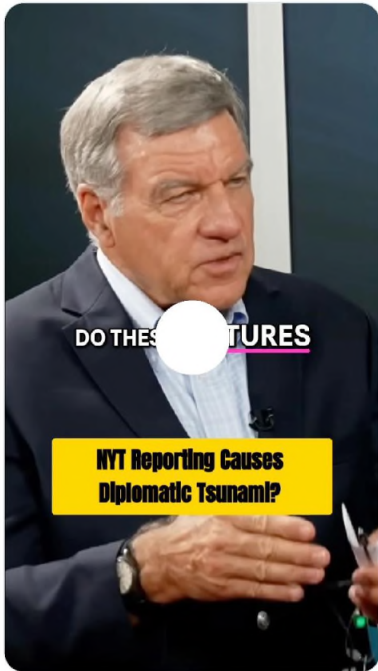
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The Underground Terror State: Why Hamas's Tunnel Network Changed the Nature of the Gaza War

Built Beneath Civilian Life

Perhaps the most disturbing feature of Hamas's tunnel system is not its size but its location.

Israeli military operations uncovered multiple detention sites connected to the wider tunnel system, illustrating how the underground network became both a military headquarters and a prison.

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This reality further distinguishes the tunnel system from conventional military fortifications.

It served simultaneously as a command center, logistics network, weapons depot, transportation system, and detention complex for kidnapped civilians.

Its existence prolonged the hostage crisis and significantly complicated rescue efforts.

Why Urban Warfare Became So Difficult

The underground network fundamentally altered^[1] the character of the Gaza conflict.

Most conventional armies position military headquarters, ammunition depots, and command facilities on military bases separate from civilian neighborhoods. Hamas chose the opposite approach.

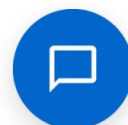

Israel's mission to Venezuela is a reminder that the strongest expression of national values is not found only in defending one's own people, but also in helping others when they need it most.

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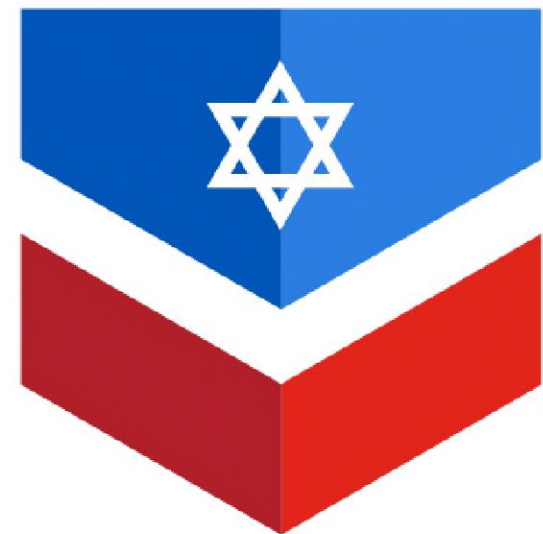
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The Unsinkable Aircraft Carrier: Why Israel Has Become America's Most Important Strategic Ally

The opposite case has become increasingly persuasive.

Rather than drawing America deeper into regional conflicts, Israel has consistently demonstrated an ability to defend itself, contribute advanced technology, share critical intelligence, and help deter common adversaries.

It is a strategic partnership in which both countries derive substantial security benefits.

That reality is increasingly recognised by senior American military leaders who have spent their careers assessing the practical requirements of regional defence rather than debating political narratives.

Conclusion

General Frank McKenzie's assessment reflects a broader transformation in how the U.S.-Israel relationship is viewed within American defence circles.

Israel is no longer seen merely as a close ally deserving support because of shared values, although those values remain important. It is increasingly recognised as one of America's most capable strategic partners, contributing intelligence, technology, operational expertise, and military capabilities that directly strengthen U.S. national security.

In an era defined by Iranian aggression, great-power competition, and rapidly evolving security threats, partnerships based on mutual strategic benefit become even more valuable.

The U.S.-Israel alliance is no longer simply about history.

It is about the future of regional stability, the defence of shared interests, and a recognition that some allies do far more than receive support—they actively enhance America's own security.

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Operation Epic Fury Was a Military Success —Now Comes the Harder Part

Together with the United States, Israel inflicted unprecedented damage on Iran's nuclear infrastructure, ballistic missile production facilities, military command structure, and key elements of the [Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps](https://factsignal.org/blog/irans-military-tactics-put-civilians-at-risk-a-pattern-of-responsibility) (<https://factsignal.org/blog/irans-military-tactics-put-civilians-at-risk-a-pattern-of-responsibility>). For the first time in decades, Tehran's military machine was placed firmly on the defensive.

Yet military victories do not automatically become lasting strategic victories.

A new assessment suggests that while Iran's nuclear programme has been severely degraded and its missile production capability significantly disrupted, the regime retains enough residual capabilities to rebuild if the international community fails to enforce the commitments contained in the June 18 Memorandum of Understanding (MoU). The challenge has therefore shifted from destroying Iran's capabilities to ensuring they are never restored.

The Military Campaign Achieved What Diplomacy Could Not

For years, Iran steadily expanded its nuclear programme while negotiations repeatedly stalled over inspections, enrichment levels and sanctions.

Operation Epic Fury dramatically^[1] altered that equation.

According to current assessments, Iran's principal enrichment facilities suffered extensive damage, much of its nuclear infrastructure has been rendered inoperable, and its ability to manufacture advanced centrifuges has been significantly degraded. Even more importantly, the strikes severely disrupted Iran's ballistic missile production network, destroying thousands of missile-related targets and setting back production capacity for years rather than months.

This represents one of the most significant strategic setbacks the Islamic Republic has experienced since the 1979 Revolution.

The Nuclear Threat Has Been Delayed—Not Eliminated

Despite these achievements, one issue continues to dominate Israeli security assessments.

Iran still possesses more than 400 kilograms of uranium enriched to 60 percent purity, only a short technical step away from weapons-grade material. While much of this material remains buried beneath damaged facilities, its existence means that Iran retains an important component of its previous nuclear programme.

The concern is not that Iran can immediately produce a nuclear weapon.

The concern is that unless this material is removed from Iran or diluted to levels that eliminate its military value, it remains a latent strategic asset that could be recovered and reused if the regime succeeds in rebuilding its nuclear infrastructure.

This is why the enriched uranium (<https://factsignal.org/blog/removing-irans-60-enriched-uranium-needs-to-be-a-central-point-of-the-negotiations>) has become the central test of the new memorandum.

If Tehran retains it, the agreement leaves behind the most dangerous^[5] element of the entire programme.

Inspections Matter More Than Promises

The June 18 Memorandum of Understanding offers an important framework for preventing Iran from rebuilding its nuclear programme.

However, agreements are only as effective as their verification mechanisms.

At present, Iran continues to restrict international inspectors from accessing many of the facilities damaged during the conflict. Without comprehensive inspections^[4], neither the International Atomic Energy Agency nor the international community can independently verify the status of remaining nuclear materials or ensure they are not quietly relocated elsewhere.

This is where previous agreements offer an important lesson.

Iran has frequently entered negotiations while simultaneously creating disputes over inspections, access, sequencing and implementation. The current agreement will only succeed if verification is comprehensive, continuous and backed by meaningful consequences for non-compliance.

Ballistic Missiles Remain Part of the Equation

The military campaign also dealt a severe blow to Iran's missile programme.

According to current assessments, the destruction of missile production facilities has significantly reduced Tehran's ability to manufacture new long-range ballistic missiles over the coming years. This represents a major strategic achievement because ballistic missiles remain Iran's principal means of projecting conventional military power throughout the region.

Yet this success is not necessarily permanent.

Should substantial financial resources begin flowing back into Iran under the MoU, and should Tehran gain access to dual-use materials and industrial components from abroad, rebuilding could begin. It may take several years rather than several months, but reconstruction^[2] remains possible if pressure is relaxed prematurely.

Military victories create opportunities.

They do not guarantee permanent outcomes.

The Next Phase Is Political

Operation Epic Fury has effectively handed diplomacy a stronger negotiating position than it has enjoyed in years.

Iran enters the current agreement from a position of unprecedented weakness. Its nuclear infrastructure has been damaged, its missile production disrupted, its air defences exposed and its regional proxy network significantly weakened.

The challenge now is ensuring that these military achievements are translated into permanent strategic gains.

That requires insisting upon full IAEA access, removing or permanently neutralising enriched uranium, maintaining restrictions on missile development and preventing the financial resources provided under the agreement from becoming the foundation of Iran's military reconstruction.

The objective should not simply be a pause in Iran's nuclear programme.

It should be ensuring that the programme never returns to its previous trajectory.

Conclusion

Operation Epic Fury demonstrated that Iran's strategic capabilities are not invulnerable.

For years, many assumed the Islamic Republic's nuclear programme had reached a point where meaningful military action could no longer alter its course. The recent campaign proved otherwise, inflicting extensive damage on both its nuclear infrastructure and missile production capacity while dramatically improving the strategic position of the United States, Israel and their regional partners.

Yet history also teaches that damaged programmes can be rebuilt if pressure fades and vigilance declines.

The June 18 Memorandum of Understanding therefore represents the beginning of a new phase rather than the end of the Iranian nuclear challenge. Its success will depend not on the promises contained in the agreement, but on whether the international community ensures that Iran cannot recover the capabilities it has spent years—and enormous resources—trying to acquire.

The military campaign created a rare strategic opportunity.

Whether that opportunity becomes a lasting victory will depend on what happens next.

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When Journalism Repeats Propaganda: The Media's Gaza Reckoning Has Begun

Journalism's first responsibility is not to be first. It is to be right. In every war, reporters face extraordinary pressure to publish quickly, often with limited access to independently verifiable information. Yet those very circumstances make scepticism, verification, and rigorous fact-checking more important than ever. When those standards are abandoned, journalism risks becoming something very different: a vehicle for propaganda.

As more evidence emerges about Hamas's information strategy during the Gaza war, difficult questions are being asked about whether much of the international media fulfilled its most basic professional obligation. For nearly two years, casualty figures, allegations, and narratives originating from Hamas-controlled institutions were reported around the world with remarkably little qualification. At the same time, Israeli evidence was frequently treated with far greater suspicion or dismissed altogether. The result was an information environment in which the claims of a designated terrorist organisation often shaped global headlines before they could be independently verified.

The issue is no longer simply whether individual stories were accurate or inaccurate. It is whether one of the world's largest terrorist organisations successfully manipulated much of the international media into amplifying its strategic narrative during wartime.

Hamas Understood the Information Battlefield

Long before October 7, Hamas understood^[2] that modern wars are fought on two fronts.

The first is the physical battlefield. The second is the information battlefield.

Military victories matter, but so do headlines, social media, international institutions, public opinion and legal proceedings. Every image, every casualty figure and every allegation has the potential to influence diplomatic pressure, military support and international legitimacy.

This is why Hamas invested enormous effort in controlling information emerging from Gaza.

The organisation governed the territory, controlled access to much of the battlefield, oversaw the Health Ministry, influenced local institutions and operated within an environment where independent international verification was extremely difficult.

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Any journalist reporting from Gaza faced extraordinary obstacles. That reality should have increased scepticism. Instead, in many cases, it appears to have reduced it.

The Asymmetry of Scepticism

One of the most striking features of the war has been the very different standards^[3] applied to competing sources.

Statements issued by Israeli officials were frequently described as unverified, disputed or requiring independent confirmation before publication. This is an entirely legitimate journalistic practice.

The difficulty is that the same level of scepticism was often absent when information originated from Hamas-controlled institutions.

Casualty figures were reported almost immediately. Allegations were widely repeated before investigations had taken place. Claims regarding military operations frequently became international headlines within hours despite the absence of independent corroboration.

No responsible journalist should automatically accept the claims of any government during wartime.

The same principle should apply equally to a terrorist organisation. Instead, much of the reporting created the impression that the burden of proof operated in only one direction.

When Propaganda Becomes News

Perhaps the most troubling consequence of this imbalance is that propaganda can become accepted as established fact before evidence has been gathered.

Once a dramatic allegation dominates international headlines, subsequent corrections rarely receive comparable attention. Public opinion is shaped by the initial narrative, even if later investigations reveal missing context, contradictory evidence or factual errors.

This pattern repeated itself throughout the Gaza conflict.

Several major allegations that initially generated worldwide outrage were subsequently revised, qualified or challenged as additional information became available. Yet those later developments rarely attracted the same level of coverage as the original claims.

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This is precisely why professional journalism has traditionally insisted upon verification before publication rather than after it.

The damage caused by misinformation is often impossible to reverse.

The Journalist Question

Recent revelations that some individuals internationally described as journalists were later identified by Hamas or Palestinian Islamic Jihad (<https://factsignal.org/blog/captured-islamic-jihad-commander-reveals-terror-training-in-iran>) as members of their military organisations have further complicated the picture.

This issue extends beyond individual cases.

It raises broader questions^[1] about how media organisations verified sources, local contributors and information networks operating inside Gaza. If some individuals simultaneously participated in armed organisations while also contributing to international media coverage, the distinction between independent journalism and information operations becomes increasingly blurred.

That possibility deserves serious examination.

Protecting genuine journalists depends upon maintaining clear distinctions between reporters and combatants.

A Crisis of Journalistic Confidence

The broader concern is not simply that mistakes were made. Mistakes occur in every conflict.

The concern is whether much of the international media gradually abandoned one of journalism's oldest principles: distrust information supplied by parties with a direct interest in influencing the outcome of a war.

Hamas possessed every incentive to maximise civilian casualty narratives, shape international opinion and increase diplomatic pressure on Israel.

That does not mean every statement issued from Gaza was false.

It does mean every statement required rigorous verification before being presented as fact.

When journalism becomes insufficiently sceptical of propaganda produced by one side while remaining intensely sceptical of the other, confidence in the profession inevitably suffers.

Information Warfare Has Changed Journalism

The Gaza conflict^[5] should serve as a warning for future wars.

Authoritarian governments, terrorist organisations and state-backed information operations increasingly recognise that influencing democratic media can be as valuable as achieving military success.

They understand that public opinion influences government policy, international institutions and battlefield decisions.

The challenge facing journalism is adapting to this new reality without abandoning its core principles.

That means applying identical evidentiary standards regardless of whether information comes from democratic governments, authoritarian regimes or terrorist organisations.

Anything less risks transforming journalism from an independent observer into an unwilling participant in modern information warfare.

Conclusion

The Gaza war may ultimately be remembered not only as a military conflict but also as one of the most significant tests of modern journalism.

Too often, information originating from Hamas-controlled institutions appears to have been treated as sufficiently reliable for immediate global dissemination, while evidence presented by Israel was subjected to a much higher threshold of proof. The result was an information imbalance that shaped international perceptions of the conflict from its earliest days.

This is not an argument that Israeli claims should have been accepted uncritically.

It is an argument that Hamas's claims should have been treated with the same scepticism that responsible journalism applies to every actor with a direct stake in the outcome of a war.

If journalism is to retain public confidence, it must learn from this experience. The profession's credibility depends not on which side it ultimately believes, but on whether it applies the same standards of evidence, verification and scepticism to all sides equally.

That is the lesson the Gaza war has exposed, and one the media cannot afford to ignore.
