

Changing the Government, Keeping the Guns: Why Hamas’s Latest Proposal Changes Nothing

In recent weeks, reports that [Hamas \(https://paxpoint.org/hamas-agreed-to-disarm-but-now-wants-to-hold-their-weapons-to-plan-another-future-massacre/\)](https://paxpoint.org/hamas-agreed-to-disarm-but-now-wants-to-hold-their-weapons-to-plan-another-future-massacre/) may be prepared to dissolve its governing role in Gaza have been presented by some as a possible breakthrough. At first glance, the proposal appears to address one of the central obstacles to post-war reconstruction by suggesting that Hamas would step aside and allow an alternative administrative body to govern the Strip.

The critical question, however, is not who collects the rubbish, issues permits, or manages municipal services. It is who controls the guns.

Hamas’s proposal amounts to little more than a political manoeuvre designed to preserve its military power while relieving itself of the burdens of governing. If Hamas retains its weapons, its command structure and its armed fighters, then the organization remains the dominant force in Gaza regardless of which civilian body formally administers day-to-day affairs. Any reconstruction plan that ignores this reality risks rebuilding Gaza while leaving intact the very organization responsible for bringing it to ruin.

Government Is Not the Source of Hamas's Power

One of the most common misconceptions about Hamas is that its authority derives primarily from governing Gaza.

In reality, Hamas's power has always rested first and foremost on its military capabilities.

The organization controls thousands of armed fighters, an extensive tunnel network, weapons stockpiles, intelligence structures and internal security forces. These assets allow Hamas to dominate Gaza regardless of which civilian institution formally administers schools, hospitals or municipal services.

This is why proposals^[2] focusing exclusively on replacing Hamas's government miss the central issue. Political administrations can be replaced. An armed organization that retains its weapons remains the ultimate authority.

Keeping the Guns Means Keeping the Power

Hamas understands precisely where its real leverage lies.

Asked to surrender its military infrastructure, the organization instead offers to relinquish its civilian responsibilities. From Hamas's perspective, this is a favourable exchange. Governing Gaza has imposed enormous financial, political and administrative burdens, particularly after the devastation of the war.

This is not unprecedented^[3].

Armed movements throughout history have often sought arrangements in which civilian authorities manage public services while the armed organization continues exercising effective power behind the scenes.

Without disarmament, formal political changes rarely alter the balance of power.

Reconstruction Cannot Succeed Alongside Armed Militias

The discussion has become particularly relevant as the United States and regional partners consider plans for Gaza's reconstruction.

Rebuilding homes, hospitals, schools and infrastructure is essential.

The question^[5] is whether reconstruction should begin before Hamas has been fully disarmed.

If billions of dollars enter Gaza while Hamas continues operating as the territory's dominant military force, there is an obvious risk that reconstruction efforts become subject to coercion, infiltration or diversion. Even if international organizations supervise projects carefully, an armed organization controlling the surrounding environment inevitably retains significant influence.

The lesson of previous reconstruction efforts after earlier conflicts is difficult to ignore.

Repeated investment in civilian infrastructure failed to prevent Hamas from simultaneously expanding its tunnel network, rebuilding military capabilities and preparing for future attacks.

A Civilian Council Without Authority

Proposals for a new governing body, including the reported National Committee for the Administration of Gaza, may appear promising on paper. Their practical effectiveness, however, depends entirely upon their authority.

A civilian administration cannot realistically govern if another organization retains the ability to deploy armed fighters, intimidate rivals, recruit personnel and enforce its own decisions independently of the state.

Governments exercise authority because they possess a monopoly over the legitimate use of force.

Where that monopoly does not exist, political institutions often struggle to function effectively.

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October 7 Changed the Equation

Before [October 7](https://paxpoint.org/stories-of-resilience/) (<https://paxpoint.org/stories-of-resilience/>), some policymakers believed it might be possible to tolerate Hamas's continued military existence while containing its activities through deterrence and periodic ceasefires. That assumption no longer exists.

The attacks^[8] demonstrated that Hamas used years of relative calm not to moderate its objectives but to prepare for one of the largest terrorist attacks in Israel's history. Extensive tunnel construction, weapons production and military planning all continued while Gaza simultaneously received international reconstruction assistance.

That experience fundamentally altered Israeli security thinking.

For many Israeli policymakers, allowing Hamas to retain its military capabilities is no longer viewed as a manageable risk.

It is viewed as an invitation to future conflict.

Peace Requires Demilitarization

The debate surrounding Gaza's future increasingly centres on reconstruction.

Equally important is demilitarization^[6].

Economic recovery, humanitarian assistance and new political institutions can only produce lasting stability if no armed organization remains capable of overturning them through force. This principle has guided post-conflict reconstruction efforts in numerous regions around the world. Gaza is unlikely to prove an exception.

Replacing one civilian administration with another while leaving Hamas's military infrastructure intact risks preserving the conditions that made repeated wars possible in the first place.

Conclusion

Hamas's reported willingness to dissolve its government may appear significant. In reality, it addresses only the least important element of the organization's power. Governments govern because they administer public institutions.

Hamas has always ruled because it possesses weapons.

Unless those weapons are surrendered, unless its military infrastructure is dismantled and unless Gaza's future government exercises exclusive authority over the use of force, changing administrative structures will not fundamentally change reality on the ground.

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It will be determined by who controls the guns.

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BREAKING THE AGREEMENT BEFORE THE INK IS DRY: IRAN'S ACTIONS IN HORMUZ UNDERMINE ITS AGREEMENT WITH THE U.S.

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The June 18 Memorandum of Understanding between the United States and Iran was presented as the beginning of a new phase in regional stability. While much of the attention focused on Iran's nuclear programme, the agreement also sought to reduce military tensions, restore confidence in regional security, and guarantee the free and safe movement of commercial shipping through the Strait of Hormuz—the world's most important energy chokepoint.

Barely weeks later, those commitments are already under serious strain.

Reports that Iranian forces attacked commercial vessels transiting the Strait of Hormuz (<https://justorium.org/the-strait-of-hormuz-and-the-risks-of-allowing-iran-to-control-global-trade-routes/>), including a Qatari liquefied natural gas tanker, represent more than another regional security incident. If confirmed, they constitute a direct challenge to one of the central understandings underpinning the memorandum itself. Agreements cannot build confidence if one party simultaneously undermines the very principles it has just accepted.

The Strait of Hormuz Was Central to the Agreement

The June 18 memorandum^[7] was never solely about nuclear issues.

One of its most important strategic objectives was restoring stability to the Strait of Hormuz after months of conflict that had disrupted global shipping and energy markets. Freedom of navigation through the waterway is not simply a regional concern. Roughly one-fifth of the world's oil and liquefied natural gas normally passes through this narrow maritime corridor, making it one of the most strategically important waterways on earth.

For that reason, safe passage through Hormuz was not an optional element of the agreement. It was one of its foundations.

Any attempt to intimidate, attack or interfere with commercial shipping therefore strikes directly at one of the memorandum's central purposes.

Actions Matter More Than Diplomatic Language

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Supporters of engagement with Iran have consistently argued that diplomacy offers the best path toward reducing tensions. That remains true.

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Diplomatic agreements, however, derive their value from implementation rather than signatures.

According to multiple reports^[8], commercial vessels—including a Qatari LNG tanker and a Saudi-linked oil tanker—were struck near the Strait of Hormuz, with U.S. officials attributing the attacks to Iranian forces. Qatar (<https://justorium.org/qatars-hidden-hand-how-state-support-helped-build-hamass-war-machine/>) has publicly held Iran responsible, describing the attack as a serious violation of international law (<https://justorium.org/international-law/un-resolutions-on-terrorism-and-self-defense/>).

If these reports are accurate, they illustrate a familiar pattern.

Tehran continues to negotiate at the diplomatic table while simultaneously creating instability on the ground.

A Familiar Pattern

This is not the first time concerns have been raised about the gap between Iran's diplomatic commitments and its operational conduct.

Over the past two decades, successive negotiations over Iran's nuclear programme have repeatedly produced disputes regarding inspections, implementation, interpretation and compliance. While formal agreements have often reduced immediate tensions, they have not always been accompanied by broader changes in Iranian regional behaviour.

The Strait of Hormuz now risks becoming another example.

Rather than building confidence following the memorandum, the reported attacks^[9] have increased insurance costs, disrupted commercial shipping and reintroduced uncertainty into global energy markets. Oil prices immediately reflected renewed fears that the world's most important maritime energy corridor could once again become a conflict zone.

That is precisely the outcome the memorandum was intended to prevent.



Confidence Is Built Through Behaviour

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Diplomacy depends upon trust. Without trust, but confidence that commitments made across the negotiating table will be reflected in subsequent conduct.

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This is particularly important with Iran because many governments entered the June

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18 agreement cautiously, recognising Tehran's previous record of disputed compliance and strategic ambiguity.

Every incident that appears inconsistent with the agreement therefore carries consequences^[4] beyond the immediate military or economic impact.

It weakens confidence that future commitments will be honoured.

For regional partners—including Gulf states whose economies depend upon secure maritime trade—the issue is not merely whether individual attacks occurred.

It is whether Iran genuinely intends to become a predictable regional actor or continues to view instability as a legitimate instrument of statecraft.

The Cost Extends Beyond the Region

The implications are global.

Disruptions in the Strait of Hormuz affect not only Middle Eastern security but also international energy prices, inflation, shipping costs and economic stability. Countries far removed from the Gulf nevertheless depend upon uninterrupted maritime commerce through this narrow waterway.

That is why attacks^[10] on commercial vessels cannot be viewed simply as bilateral disputes.

They represent challenges to one of the world's most important international trade routes and to the principle of freedom of navigation itself.

The June 18 memorandum sought to reassure global markets that this era of instability was ending.

Events this week suggest that reassurance may have been premature.

Diplomacy Requires Consequences

None of this means the memorandum should be abandoned. Diplomatic engagement remains preferable to military escalation. However, successful diplomacy requires more than continuing dialogue.

It requires clear expectations, rigorous verification and meaningful consequences when commitments are not honoured.

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The June 18 Memorandum of Understanding offered an opportunity to reduce tensions and establish a more stable regional order. That opportunity remains worth pursuing.

But diplomacy cannot succeed if one party signs agreements while simultaneously engaging in conduct that undermines their central objectives.

The reported attacks on commercial shipping in the Strait of Hormuz raise serious questions about whether Iran is prepared to match its diplomatic commitments with responsible behaviour. If Tehran wishes the international community to believe that it has entered a new chapter, the burden rests on the regime to demonstrate that change through consistent actions rather than carefully worded statements.

In international relations, trust is never created by signatures alone.

It is earned through conduct—and at the moment, Iran's conduct risks undermining the very agreement it claims to support.

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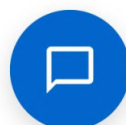


“Death to America” Is Not Just a Slogan: Iran’s Assassination Threats Show the Regime’s True Intentions

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Diplomatic agreements are often judged by the language contained in official documents. They are better judged by the actions and rhetoric that follow them. In the weeks after the June 18 Memorandum of Understanding between the United States and Iran, many hoped that the agreement would mark the beginning of a broader reduction in tensions between Tehran and Washington.

Yet events surrounding the funeral of senior Iranian leaders have painted a very different picture. Alongside chants of “Death to America” and the attendance of leaders from Hamas, Hezbollah (<https://factsignal.org/blog/hezbollahs-abuse-of-ambulances-shows-why-it-is-not-interested-in-ceasefire>), Palestinian Islamic Jihad (<https://factsignal.org/blog/captured-islamic-jihad-commander-reveals-terror-training-in-iran>), the Houthis, and other Iranian-backed organizations, supporters of the regime were filmed openly calling for the assassination of President Donald Trump. These were not isolated online extremists operating in obscurity. The



Statements were made publicly during one of the Islamic Republic's most important state ceremonies, highlighting the continuing influence of revolutionary ideology within the regime and raising serious questions about Tehran's long-term intentions.

The contrast could hardly be sharper. While Iranian diplomats speak the language of negotiation, influential figures associated with the regime continue to glorify violence against American leaders and celebrate organizations responsible for attacks against both the United States and its allies.

Revolutionary Ideology Remains Central

One of the arguments frequently advanced in support of engagement with Iran is that diplomacy can gradually moderate the regime's behaviour.

The funeral ceremony offered little evidence of such moderation.

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The event was dominated by themes that have defined the Islamic Republic since 1979: hostility toward the United States, celebration of the so-called "Axis of Resistance," and glorification of confrontation with the West. Chants of "Death to America" echoed throughout the gathering, while individuals interviewed during the ceremony openly called for President Trump's assassination.

Whether these statements represent official government policy or not, they reveal an environment in which violent rhetoric directed against American leaders remains publicly acceptable and, in some cases, openly celebrated.

That matters because political culture often reveals as much about a regime's priorities as official diplomatic communiqués.

The Guest List Told Its Own Story

Equally revealing was who attended.

The funeral brought together many of the Middle East's most prominent leaders and representatives^[3] of Iranian-backed terrorist organizations, including Hezbollah, Hamas, Palestinian Islamic Jihad, and the Houthis. Together, they represented the network through which Tehran has projected military and political influence across the region for decades.

This was not simply a religious ceremony.

It was a gathering of the very organizations that have targeted American forces, attacked Israeli civilians, destabilized Arab governments, and undermined regional security.

At a time when Iran seeks to convince the international community that it is committed to reducing tensions, the symbolism of publicly embracing these organizations should not be overlooked.

Diplomacy and Incitement Cannot Coexist Indefinitely

The June 18 Memorandum of Understanding created an opportunity to reduce the risk of further military escalation.

That opportunity remains important.

However, successful diplomacy depends upon more than technical agreements concerning nuclear facilities or sanctions. It also depends upon creating an atmosphere in which dialogue replaces incitement and political engagement replaces threats of violence.

Public calls for assassinating the President of the United States move in precisely the opposite direction.

Even if such remarks are dismissed as emotional rhetoric from supporters rather than official policy, governments committed to improving relations generally seek to discourage such behaviour rather than allowing it to dominate nationally significant public events.

The continued prominence of this rhetoric inevitably undermines confidence in Tehran's broader diplomatic messaging.

The Threat Extends Beyond Israel

The funeral also reinforced an important strategic reality.

Iran's confrontation has never been directed solely against Israel.

For decades, Tehran has described America as the "Great Satan" and Israel as the "Little Satan," presenting both countries as central adversaries in its revolutionary worldview. American embassies, military personnel, regional allies, and political leaders have repeatedly been targeted directly or indirectly through Iran's extensive proxy network.

The rhetoric^[6] heard during the funeral demonstrates that this ideological framework remains firmly intact.

Those who continue to portray Iran's conflict as solely an Israeli issue increasingly find themselves contradicted by the regime's own supporters.

Actions Matter More Than Promises

None of this means diplomacy should be abandoned.

Diplomatic engagement remains an essential tool for preventing conflict and limiting nuclear proliferation.

But diplomacy must also be grounded in realism.

The international community should evaluate Iran not only through the agreements it signs but through the alliances it maintains, the rhetoric it tolerates, and the behaviour it encourages.

State ceremonies are carefully choreographed events.

The messages communicated there are rarely accidental.

When chants of "Death to America" accompany public calls for assassinating an American president while leaders of internationally designated terrorist organizations

occupy places of honour, those images inevitably become part of any serious

Conclusion

The funeral ceremony following Operation Epic Fury

(<https://factsignal.org/blog/operation-epic-fury-is-a-strategic-disaster-for-china>) provided an unusually candid glimpse into the Islamic Republic's political culture.

While diplomats continue to speak of negotiation and regional stability, the event celebrated many of the same themes that have defined Iran's revolutionary ideology for nearly half a century: hostility toward America, solidarity with armed proxy organizations, and the glorification of confrontation rather than reconciliation.

The June 18 Memorandum of Understanding remains an important opportunity to reduce tensions.

But agreements alone cannot erase decades of ideology.

If Iran genuinely seeks a different relationship with the United States, that change will ultimately be measured not only by nuclear inspections or diplomatic meetings, but by whether the regime is prepared to reject the rhetoric of assassination, abandon its support for terrorist proxies, and replace chants of "Death to America" with the language of genuine coexistence.

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For decades, international [human rights](https://justorium.org/the-theater-of-the-absurd-iran-was-just-elected-to-a-un-human-rights-committee/) organizations have occupied a position of enormous influence. Their reports shape media coverage, inform United Nations investigations, influence government policy, and are frequently cited in international courts, universities, and diplomatic forums. Their authority has always rested on one fundamental assumption: that they are guided by evidence, apply universal standards, and remain independent of political or ideological bias.

A new report by the Geneva-based initiative EIGHT challenges that assumption. Based on testimony from more than 70 current and former employees from leading international NGOs—including [Amnesty International](https://justorium.org/amnesty-internationals-double-standard-and-its-belated-admission-of-hamas-crimes/)—the report alleges a culture in which [antisemitism](https://justorium.org/when-political-cartoons-cross-the-line-sinister-antisemitic-imagery-in-modern-media/), ideological conformity, and hostility toward dissent have become increasingly entrenched within parts of the human rights sector. If substantiated, these allegations have implications far beyond the treatment of Jewish employees. They raise important questions about the credibility of organizations whose findings increasingly shape international understanding of conflicts around the world.

Reports published by organizations such as Amnesty International or Human Rights Watch often acquire an authority that extends far beyond public advocacy.

This influence brings significant responsibility.

That makes the integrity of their methodology every bit as important as the evidence they seek to uncover.

A Culture of Ideological Conformity?

Perhaps the most significant finding of the EiGHT report^[1] is not its allegations of antisemitism alone, but its description of an organizational culture that allegedly discourages internal dissent.

According to numerous former employees, questioning dominant narratives surrounding Israel increasingly became professionally risky. Some describe an atmosphere in which alternative interpretations of evidence, concerns about methodological consistency, or objections to inflammatory language were met not with debate but with hostility or marginalization.

Healthy institutions depend upon intellectual diversity.

Research organizations become stronger when assumptions are challenged, evidence is rigorously tested, and competing interpretations are openly debated. If organizations instead reward ideological conformity, there is a risk that conclusions become increasingly predictable before investigations have even begun.

For institutions whose credibility rests on impartiality, that should concern everyone, regardless of their political views.

From Research to Advocacy

The report also raises broader questions^[2] about whether some NGOs have gradually shifted from documenting human rights abuses to actively promoting predetermined political narratives.

Former staff argue that concepts such as “apartheid” and more recently “genocide” increasingly became organizing frameworks through which evidence was interpreted rather than legal conclusions reached only after comprehensive investigation.

Whether one agrees with those characterizations or not, there is no doubt that such terminology carries profound legal and diplomatic consequences.

Accountability Should Apply to Everyone

One of the central principles of the international human rights movement is that no institution should be exempt from scrutiny.

Governments, militaries, corporations, and international organizations are all expected to accept criticism, investigate allegations, and operate transparently.

The same principle should apply to NGOs themselves.

Organizations that investigate others should welcome independent examination of their own methodologies, internal culture, funding, governance, and research standards. Doing so would not undermine their legitimacy.

It would reinforce it.

Public confidence grows when institutions demonstrate that they are willing to apply to themselves the same principles they advocate for everyone else.

Why This Matters Beyond Israel

Although much of the report focuses on Israel and antisemitism, its implications^[3] are considerably broader.

If institutional bias can influence investigations concerning Israel, it could potentially affect reporting on conflicts elsewhere, whether in Sudan, Ukraine, China, Iran, Myanmar, or Venezuela.

The credibility of international human rights reporting depends upon confidence that conclusions are driven solely by evidence rather than prevailing ideological assumptions.

This is not simply an Israeli issue.

It is a question about the integrity of one of the most influential sectors shaping global public policy.



Strengthening Human Rights Through Reform

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The answer is not to dismiss human rights organizations.
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They continue to play an essential role documenting atrocities, defending vulnerable communities, and exposing genuine abuses around the world.

Precisely because that work is so important, maintaining the highest standards of professionalism and impartiality is essential.

Independent peer review, greater methodological transparency, stronger protections for internal dissent, and clear safeguards against ideological bias would strengthen the human rights movement rather than weaken it.

Institutions that welcome scrutiny generally emerge more credible, not less.

Conclusion

The EiGHT report presents a serious challenge to some of the world's most influential human rights organizations. Its allegations, made by dozens of current and former NGO professionals, deserve careful consideration and independent examination rather than dismissal.

The issue is ultimately larger than any single organization or any single conflict.

Institutions that wield significant influence over international law, diplomacy, and public opinion must themselves be prepared to meet the highest standards of transparency, intellectual honesty, and accountability.

Human rights organizations have long argued that no government should be above scrutiny.

The same principle should apply to the institutions that increasingly shape the world's understanding of human rights itself.

The Muslim Brotherhood Is Rebuilding—And Qatar and Turkey Are Leading the Way

Egypt outlawed the Brotherhood after the fall of Mohamed Morsi, several Gulf states designated it a terrorist organization, and many of its regional networks appeared fragmented and weakened.

However, reports of the Brotherhood's demise have been greatly exaggerated. Rather than disappearing, the movement has adapted. This development has implications that extend far beyond regional politics. The Brotherhood has long served as both an ideological incubator and political ecosystem from which organizations such as Hamas have emerged, making its revival a matter of growing international concern.

The Brotherhood Never Truly Disappeared

Following the events of the Arab Spring, many observers assumed that the Muslim Brotherhood had suffered a decisive strategic defeat.

Its governments collapsed, its leadership faced imprisonment or exile, and its political influence appeared to diminish across much of the Arab world. Egypt's decision to outlaw the movement was widely viewed as a turning point that would permanently reduce its regional influence.

The new analysis^[2] argues that this assessment overlooked one of the Brotherhood's greatest strengths: its ability to survive through decentralization.

Unlike conventional political parties, the Brotherhood has always functioned through a broad ecosystem of educational institutions, religious organizations, charities, professional associations, media outlets, and international networks. Even where its political organizations weakened, much of that wider infrastructure remained intact.

Rather than disappearing, the movement appears to have entered a period of strategic adaptation.

Qatar and Turkey's Central Role

Qatar and Turkey have become the two principal^[3] state actors facilitating the Brotherhood's revival.

Both countries have for years maintained relationships with Brotherhood-affiliated figures, media organizations, and political movements that were increasingly unwelcome elsewhere in the region. Doha has often presented itself as a mediator

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capable of maintaining dialogue with a wide range of Islamist actors, while Ankara under President Recep Tayyip Erdoğan has frequently expressed ideological sympathy toward Brotherhood-inspired political movements.

Critics argue that these relationships have allowed the Brotherhood to preserve international influence despite losing formal political power in several Arab states.

Whether through media platforms, financial support, political asylum, or diplomatic engagement, Qatar and Turkey are widely viewed by many regional governments as providing space for Brotherhood networks to regroup and reorganize.

This perception continues to generate significant tension within the broader Middle East.

Hamas Cannot Be Understood in Isolation

Hamas is often analysed primarily as a Palestinian terrorist organization.

Historically, however, Hamas emerged directly from the Palestinian branch^[8] of the Muslim Brotherhood and continues to reflect many of the Brotherhood's ideological principles. While the organization has developed its own military and political identity, its intellectual roots remain firmly embedded within the Brotherhood's worldview.

Understanding Hamas therefore requires understanding the wider ecosystem from which it emerged.

If the Brotherhood succeeds in rebuilding its broader international influence, many policymakers worry that organizations inspired by similar ideological principles could gain renewed confidence and legitimacy in other regions.

The issue is therefore considerably broader than Gaza alone.

Beyond the Middle East

The Brotherhood's influence is not confined to the Arab world.

Over many decades, Brotherhood-inspired organizations have established educational institutions, charities, advocacy groups, religious organizations and community networks^[7] throughout Europe and North America. Most operate entirely within the law and reject violence, but governments in several countries have nevertheless debated whether some networks promote forms of political Islam that create fertile ground for later radicalization.

This distinction is important.

The concern expressed by many security analysts is rarely that every Brotherhood-affiliated organization engages in terrorism.

As a result, developments within the Brotherhood are increasingly viewed as relevant to broader discussions about extremism and democratic resilience.

An Ideological Contest

The debate surrounding the Brotherhood is ultimately about more than security. It reflects competing visions for the future of the Middle East.

Many Arab governments have increasingly prioritized economic modernization, state sovereignty, regional integration, and pragmatic diplomacy. The Abraham Accords, expanding Gulf-Israel cooperation, and recent regional economic initiatives all reflect this trend.

The Brotherhood represents a different model.

Its vision places political Islam^[6] at the centre of public life and has often challenged existing state structures in favour of transnational ideological movements.

The question raised by the *Aspenia* analysis is whether recent geopolitical changes are creating new opportunities for that vision to regain momentum.

Why It Matters

The possible revival of the Muslim Brotherhood should not be viewed simply through the lens of one movement or one country.

Ideas have consequences.

Political movements evolve, splinter, adapt, and influence subsequent generations of activists in ways that are often difficult to predict. Understanding how organizations rebuild after periods of apparent decline is therefore essential for policymakers attempting to anticipate future regional developments.

Whether the Brotherhood^[1] ultimately succeeds in restoring its former influence remains uncertain.

What is clear is that many governments no longer assume the movement has disappeared.

Increasingly, they believe it has merely changed strategy.

Conclusion

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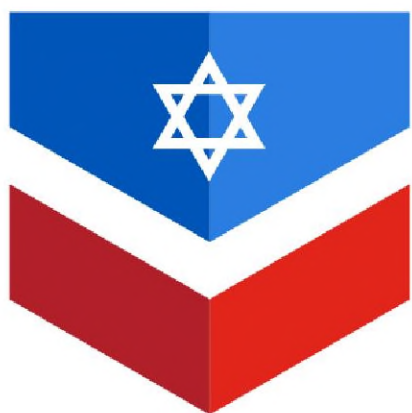

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Building Permanence: America's New Embassy Compound Reinforces Jerusalem's Enduring Status

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Diplomatic buildings are more than offices. They are physical expressions of foreign policy, national priorities, and long-term strategic commitments. Few decisions carry greater symbolic significance than where a country chooses to locate its embassy, particularly in one of the world's most contested cities. The announcement that the United States and Israel have signed an agreement for the construction of a permanent American embassy compound in Jerusalem is therefore about far more than bricks and concrete. It is a statement that the United States views its recognition of Jerusalem as Israel's capital not as a temporary political decision, but as a lasting feature of American policy.



The agreement, signed by Israeli Foreign Minister Gideon Sa'ar and U.S. Ambassador Mike Huckabee, marks another important milestone in a process that began with the relocation of the U.S. Embassy from Tel Aviv to Jerusalem in 2018. Jerusalem remains one of the most politically sensitive cities in the world.

Its religious significance to Jews, Christians and Muslims ensures that questions surrounding its future continue to feature prominently in international diplomacy.

At the same time, there is an important distinction between the final status issues that remain subject to future negotiations and the practical functioning of Israel's government today.

Every sovereign nation has a capital from which it governs.

For Israel, that capital is Jerusalem.
