By offering a calm, factual perspective during everyday chats, you help your friends see past the bias and recognize prejudice for what it is.

Some released prisoners later became senior Hamas leaders who allegedly helped plan, finance, or carry out the October 7 massacre. Researchers argue the payments reduced the financial cost of terrorism and helped sustain experienced operatives after prison.

New Name. Same Policy.

Although reforms were announced in 2025, the study says substantial payments continued through different administrative channels.

The warning: Unless the underlying system is truly dismantled, it could continue creating incentives that support future terrorism.

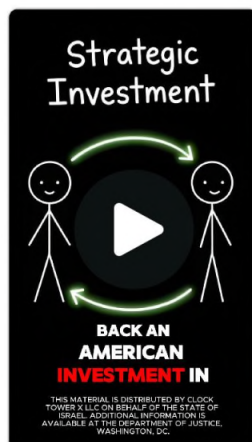

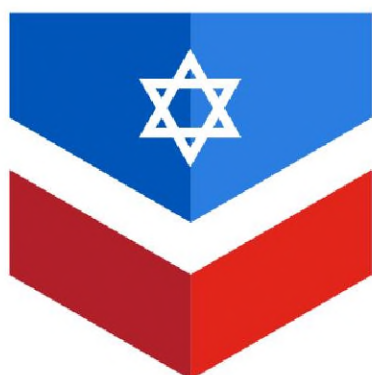

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From Iron Dome to the Abraham Accords: How U.S.-Israel Cooperation Delivers Results

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The U.S.-Israel relationship is frequently discussed in terms of diplomatic declarations, military assistance or shared values. Yet some of the strongest evidence for the alliance can be found in what the two countries have actually built together.

For many years, American lawmakers visiting Israel have witnessed firsthand the technologies, security challenges and regional opportunities that make the partnership strategically valuable to both countries. Those visits have helped advance initiatives ranging from Iron Dome to regional cooperation that ultimately contributed to the environment surrounding the Abraham Accords (<https://allyvia.org/blog/why-israels-integration-into-centcom-reshaped-regional-security/>).



Perhaps the clearest example is Iron Dome. When en five members of the House Armed Services Committee visited Israel in 2011, the missile defense system was so new that Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu (<https://allyvia.org/blog/trump-and-netanyahu-show-unity-at-florida-meeting/>) reportedly had to declassify aspects of it so they could see the technology. Within three months, their efforts helped triple congressional funding for the system.

Fifteen years later, that investment illustrates something fundamental about the alliance. U.S.-Israel cooperation does not simply protect Israel. It develops capabilities, relationships and strategic opportunities that also make America stronger.

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Seeing Israel Changes the Conversation

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Maps, intelligence briefings and committee hearings can explain Israel's security challenges, but

standing near its borders provides a different perspective on the country's size and vulnerability.

That was one objective of the congressional visits organized by the U.S.-Israel Education Association beginning in 2011. Dozens of American lawmakers have since travelled to Israel to examine security, technology and geopolitical issues directly.

The impact of those visits demonstrates the importance of policymakers seeing the realities behind the legislation they debate.

Iron Dome provides perhaps the best example.

The Iron Dome Story

When the first USIEA delegation visited Israel, Iron Dome was still in its infancy.

Five members of the House Armed Services Committee were shown the new system. According to USIEA founder Heather Johnston, they returned to Washington so impressed by its potential that they met with 54 congressional colleagues.

Within three months, funding for Iron Dome was tripled.

What followed became one of the great success stories of modern missile defense.

Iron Dome has intercepted thousands of rockets threatening civilian populations and demonstrated the potential of highly sophisticated short-range missile interception.

But this should not be viewed simply as American money protecting Israeli cities.

The cooperation generated knowledge and technology increasingly relevant to America's own defense.

America Benefits Too

The United States Army subsequently purchased two Iron Dome batteries, while the U.S. Marine Corps has integrated elements of the system into its own Medium Range Intercept Capability.

American defense company Raytheon and Israel's Rafael have also established joint production arrangements, including a manufacturing facility in Arkansas that opened in 2025.

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David's Slings is jointly produced with Raytheon, while Boeing participates in the Arrow missile-defense program. Israeli technologies and battlefield experience contribute to American understanding of drones, rockets, ballistic missiles and other threats increasingly faced by U.S. forces and allies.

American investment therefore generates something much more valuable than a one-way transfer.

It creates technology, manufacturing, operational knowledge and defense capabilities that flow in both directions.

Cooperation Helped Change the Middle East

The congressional visits also exposed American policymakers to another emerging possibility: cooperation between Israel and Arab states based upon shared interests.

Long before the Abraham Accords were formally signed in 2020, relationships were developing beneath the surface between Israel and countries increasingly concerned about Iran, Islamist extremism, economic development and technological modernization.

Bringing policymakers into the region helped them understand that the old assumption that Arab-Israeli normalization could only follow a final Israeli-Palestinian agreement was no longer necessarily correct.

The Abraham Accords ultimately demonstrated what could happen when Washington encouraged regional cooperation rather than treating conflict as inevitable.

Israel established formal relations with the United Arab Emirates, Bahrain and Morocco, creating new opportunities in trade, tourism, technology, defense and investment.

The result was not simply an Israeli diplomatic achievement.

It advanced a longstanding American objective of creating a more integrated, stable and cooperative Middle East.

Israel as a Strategic Laboratory

The broader context goes beyond individual programs.

Technologies are not merely developed in laboratories. They are frequently tested against real threats, generating operational information that can then be shared with American partners.

Missile defense is the most visible example, but the same dynamic exists in cybersecurity, counter-drone technology, artificial intelligence, intelligence gathering, battlefield medicine and counterterrorism.

America contributes extraordinary industrial capacity, resources and technological expertise.

Israel contributes innovation, operational experience and an unusually fast development culture.

Together, the two countries can often achieve more than either could independently.

An Alliance Based on Results

The U.S.-Israel relationship is sometimes portrayed by critics primarily as a question of what America gives Israel.

That framing misses much of what has developed over the past several decades.

The alliance has produced intelligence sharing, jointly developed weapons systems, American manufacturing, technological innovation and regional diplomatic breakthroughs.

Israel also provides the United States with a reliable democratic partner in a strategically critical region connecting Europe, Asia and Africa.

That does not mean Washington and Jerusalem will agree on every policy.

Allies rarely do.

The strength of the relationship lies precisely in the fact that it has survived disagreements while continuing to produce tangible strategic benefits.

Fifteen Years Tell a Larger Story

The congressional delegations highlighted by Fox News provide an interesting window into how alliances actually develop.

Sometimes major strategic changes begin with policymakers simply seeing something for themselves.

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Five lawmakers saw an experimental missile-defense system. They returned to Washington convinced it deserved support.

That decision helped develop a technology that has since saved countless lives and contributed to American missile-defense capabilities.

Other lawmakers encountered emerging relationships between Israel and Arab countries that once seemed politically impossible.

Years later, those relationships became public through the Abraham Accords.

Conclusion

The past 15 years demonstrate what makes the U.S.-Israel relationship so valuable.

It is not simply an alliance sustained by history or sentiment. It is a partnership that repeatedly produces practical results.

Iron Dome demonstrates what happens when American resources and Israeli innovation combine. The Abraham Accords demonstrate what can happen when American diplomatic power works alongside Israel's growing relationships throughout the Middle East. Defense cooperation demonstrates how technology developed to protect Israeli civilians can ultimately strengthen American forces and American allies.

The relationship therefore should not be measured simply by what Washington provides Jerusalem.

It should be measured by what America receives in return: intelligence, technology, military innovation, regional partnerships and a highly capable ally confronting many of the same threats facing the United States.

Fifteen years of congressional engagement provide a useful reminder that when American policymakers see this partnership up close, the strategic logic becomes much clearer.

America's investment in Israel's security has helped protect Israel.

But the capabilities and alliances produced through that cooperation have also helped make America safer, stronger and better positioned to confront the challenges of an increasingly dangerous world.

IRAN IS BUILDING MISSILES TO REACH AMERICA

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For years, Israel has warned that the threat posed by the Islamic Republic of Iran does not stop at Israel's borders.

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Iranian leaders have threatened Israel with destruction, built an extensive network of armed proxies across the Middle East, developed

increasingly sophisticated ballistic missiles and pursued nuclear

capabilities that have alarmed governments throughout the region. Yet

outside Israel, these warnings have sometimes been dismissed as

primarily an Israeli concern.



The latest statement from Iran should remove any such illusion.

On August 7, senior Iranian cleric  Abdolnabi Mousavifard declared that Iran is preparing to extend the range of its missiles to 15,000 kilometers, or approximately 9,300 miles, explicitly stating that the objective would be to reach deep inside the United States. He went further, saying Iran was preparing so that Americans themselves would experience being struck by missiles and left amid "blood and destruction."

This was not rhetoric about defending Iran. It was an explicit vision of acquiring the capability to strike American territory.

The message should be understood clearly: Israel may be on the front line of the confrontation with the Islamic Republic, but Israel was never intended to be the final line.

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Tehran Is Saying Exactly What It Wants

The international community has sometimes treated extreme Iranian rhetoric as something intended primarily for domestic consumption.

That becomes increasingly difficult when Iranian figures explicitly describe the military capabilities they want their country to acquire.

Mousavifard did not merely discuss improving Iran's missile program. He identified a specific range of 15,000 kilometers and connected that capability directly to striking Americans.

Iran's existing missile arsenal is already one of the largest and most sophisticated in the Middle East. The development of missiles capable of travelling several times farther would represent an entirely different strategic capability.

It would potentially transform Iran from a regional missile threat into one capable of directly threatening the American homeland.

Israel therefore represents the threat Iran can already reach.

America represents the capability it wants next.

That distinction should matter enormously in Washington.

The latest rhetoric suggests Americans should not assume geography will protect them indefinitely.

"Death to America" Was Never Just a Slogan

Iran's hostility toward the United States is not a recent development.

"Death to America" has been one of the defining slogans of the Islamic Republic since the 1979 revolution.

American diplomats were held hostage in Tehran.

Iranian-backed groups have killed American service members.

The Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps and its proxies have repeatedly targeted American interests throughout the Middle East.

Iranian officials portray the United States as the principal global enemy of their revolutionary project, while Israel is routinely described as America's regional extension.

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When representatives of a regime that has spent decades describing America as its enemy openly discuss building missiles capable of striking the United States, those statements deserve to be taken seriously.

Missiles and Nuclear Ambitions Cannot Be Separated



There is another reason the proposed range should alarm Washington.

Ballistic missiles are ultimately delivery systems.

Iran's nuclear program and its ballistic missile program are therefore not entirely separate strategic questions.

A nuclear-capable Iran possessing missiles capable of reaching the United States would represent a fundamentally different security environment from the one America faces today.

Even without nuclear warheads, long-range missiles could potentially carry conventional or other unconventional payloads and create enormous strategic pressure.

The combination of nuclear capability and intercontinental-range missiles is precisely why preventing further Iranian advances matters far beyond Israel.

Israel Has Been Buying the West Time

For years, Israel has carried much of the immediate burden of confronting Iran's regional strategy.

It has targeted weapons transfers to Hezbollah, disrupted Iranian military entrenchment in Syria, fought Iranian-backed terrorist organizations and invested enormous resources in missile defense.

This website and its strategy consequences extend considerably further.

But their strategy consequences extend considerably further. Every Iranian capability weakened, every weapons network disrupted and every proxy constrained reduces the strength of a regime that openly identifies America and the wider West as enemies.

It is confronting the most immediate manifestation of a much broader ideological and strategic challenge.

There is nothing wrong with that objective. Preventing war through a credible agreement is preferable whenever possible.

But diplomacy cannot succeed by ignoring what Iranian leaders themselves say.

Negotiations over nuclear enrichment, missile capabilities and sanctions are not abstract diplomatic exercises. They concern the capabilities of a regime whose senior figures continue openly discussing violence against the United States and Israel.

Any agreement must therefore be judged by what Iran demonstrably gives up and what can be reliably verified, not simply by promises of moderation or temporary reductions in tension.

This Is an American National Security Issue

The greatest mistake Washington could make would be to continue viewing Iran primarily through the prism of Israel.

Israel has particular reasons to fear the Islamic Republic because it is geographically closer and repeatedly threatened with destruction.

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A 2,000-kilometer missile threatens Jerusalem.

A 15,000-kilometer missile potentially threatens America.

The difference is engineering, not intention.

The world should listen.



For years, Israel has warned that Iran's ambitions extend far beyond destroying the Jewish state. The regime's own rhetoric repeatedly identifies America and the wider Western order as enemies, while its proxies, missile program and nuclear ambitions provide the instruments through which those ideological objectives could increasingly be pursued.

UN Data Shatters the Gaza Starvation Narrative

For much of the Gaza war, one of the most damaging accusations against Israel was presented around the world almost as established fact: Israel was deliberately starving Gaza.

Warnings of imminent famine dominated headlines, international organizations issued increasingly grave assessments, and politicians and activists accused Israel of using hunger as a weapon of war. The starvation narrative became central to broader accusations of war crimes and genocide.

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According to an analysis, a nutritional survey coordinated through the UNICEF-led Nutrition Cluster found acute child malnutrition rates measured by weight-for-height of just 0.2 to 0.8 percent across the areas surveyed. Gaza's pre-war rate was approximately 0.8 percent.



The implications are profound. These figures do not resemble population-wide starvation. More importantly, the new measurements appear to undermine a crucial statistical assumption used in the earlier determination that famine existed in Gaza.

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The Numbers Tell a Very Different Story

The significance of the new study comes from what researchers actually measured.

Children across Gaza were assessed using internationally recognized indicators of acute malnutrition, including weight-for-height z-scores, or WHZ.

According to the analysis, acute malnutrition measured using WHZ ranged from approximately 0.2 percent to 0.8 percent across different areas.

That is an extraordinary finding when compared with the approximately 0.8 percent recorded before the war.

It does not mean individual Gazans never suffered from hunger or malnutrition. But it is extremely difficult to reconcile these figures with the sweeping portrayal of Gaza as a population experiencing mass starvation.

A Major Problem for the Previous Famine Finding

The implications become even more significant when examining how famine was previously assessed.

One of the criteria used in famine classification is the prevalence of acute malnutrition among children.

According to the *JC* analysis, suitable WHZ measurements were unavailable when the IPC made its 2025 assessment. Instead, it relied upon another indicator known as mid-upper-arm circumference, or MUAC.

The methodology assumed a relationship between the two measurements under which WHZ would detect approximately twice the prevalence of acute malnutrition identified by MUAC. That allowed a 15 percent MUAC threshold to substitute for a 30 percent WHZ

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The latest Gaza-specific data reportedly show the opposite relationship. When researchers actually measured both indicators among Gazan children, WHZ produced lower, rather than substantially higher, malnutrition prevalence.

If correct, this is not a technical footnote. It challenges an important assumption underpinning one of the most explosive humanitarian conclusions of the entire war.

Hunger and Famine Are Not the Same Thing

Gaza undoubtedly experienced serious humanitarian hardship.

War disrupted food distribution, destroyed infrastructure, displaced families and damaged the local economy. There were periods of shortages and significant food insecurity, and some individuals undoubtedly experienced severe malnutrition.

But those facts are different from establishing population-wide famine, and further still from proving that Israel deliberately starved Gaza.

These distinctions matter.

"Food insecurity," "hunger," "malnutrition" and "famine" describe different conditions. Famine has specific internationally recognized thresholds precisely because the term describes one of the most extreme humanitarian catastrophes imaginable.

Using the terminology interchangeably may produce powerful headlines, but it does not produce accurate analysis.

Israel Faced an Extraordinary Accusation

The accusation against Israel went much further than saying civilians were suffering during war.

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It profoundly shaped how millions of people understood the war.

An accusation of that magnitude requires exceptionally strong evidence.

If subsequent UN-generated data challenge the assumptions on which some of those conclusions rested, the evidence deserves the same international attention as the original allegations.

The Humanitarian System Was Operating

The figures also demonstrate the importance of recognizing the enormous humanitarian operation that existed alongside the war.

International organizations distributed food parcels, flour, bread, hot meals, nutritional supplements and other assistance across Gaza. Israel facilitated enormous quantities of aid entering the territory even while fighting Hamas.

Distribution was frequently difficult. Fighting disrupted routes, infrastructure was damaged, criminal gangs looted supplies and Hamas itself was repeatedly accused of interfering with humanitarian operations.

None of that resembles a simple story in which Israel sealed Gaza and prevented its population from eating.

The reality was considerably more complicated.

Where Are the Corrective Headlines?

The international media have an important responsibility here.

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Information on social media. Images associated with starvation were shared around the world, frequently without sufficient context regarding underlying illnesses or whether individual cases represented the broader population.

If new evidence substantially contradicts that portrayal, it cannot be relegated to a footnote.

Journalistic accountability requires following evidence wherever it leads.

If evidence incriminates Israel, it should be reported.

If evidence undermines accusations against Israel, that deserves reporting too.

Palestinian Suffering Does Not Need Exaggeration

Recognizing problems with the starvation narrative does not require denying Palestinian suffering.

Gaza endured an extraordinarily destructive war.

Civilians were killed and injured. Families were displaced. Homes and infrastructure were destroyed. Food distribution became difficult and many people experienced genuine hardship.

Those realities deserve acknowledgement.

But Palestinian suffering does not need to be exaggerated to matter.

Indeed, exaggeration can ultimately undermine humanitarian advocacy because when dramatic claims are later contradicted by better evidence, trust in the institutions making them deteriorates.

Humanitarian organizations have an obligation to Palestinians, Israelis and the international public to distinguish carefully between evidence, estimates and worst-case projections.

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Conclusion

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The latest UN-system nutritional data represent one of the most significant challenges yet to the Gaza starvation narrative.

Acute malnutrition measured through weight-for-height reportedly stands between approximately 0.2 and 0.8 percent across the surveyed areas, compared with a pre-war level of approximately 0.8 percent. At

the same time, the new measurements appear to contradict an important assumption used in the previous famine classification.

This does not mean Gaza experienced no hunger, deprivation or humanitarian suffering.

It means something much more specific and consequential: the sweeping narrative that Israel systematically starved Gaza now faces powerful contradictory evidence from within the international humanitarian system itself.

For much of the war, accusations of starvation were treated not as claims requiring continuing scrutiny but as established truths. They helped shape global attitudes toward Israel, fueled allegations of genocide and became some of the most powerful weapons in the information war surrounding Gaza.

Now the evidence has changed.

The same institutions, politicians and media organizations that amplified the original accusations should have the intellectual honesty to examine what the new data show.

Because when the UN system's own figures challenge one of the defining narratives of the war, the appropriate response is not to protect the narrative.

It is to follow the evidence.

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
